Once again Woodcraft will support this annual Veteran's day project. We would welcome anyone to join us and help this worthwhile cause. Woodcraft will supply all materials and lathes, all collected pens will be immediately distributed to U.S. Troops overseas through the organization's founder, SawMill Creek. Suggestions of items to be purchased for the following month can be given to the President, Corey Anderson. The lathe tools purchased for evaluation is to be limited to \$115.


The tool to be evaluated for September is the Termite Multi-Tip Ring Tool, purchased from Packard Woodworks. (Summer 2007, Pg. 17). 'The terminator is a ring tool that can hallow into end grain' 'The tool is very useful in hallowing of boxes, goblets and hollow vessels, it can also be used for face grain bowls'. Purchased with the Termite is what Packard Woodworks call's Option #3, 'the Termite cutter which measures 5/8"in diameter is capable of moving more wood per pass. "The Termite comes with a grinding point that is held in the router to sharpen for cutters. This is easily done with the sharpening fixture that is included. The Termite has a 13" long hardwood handle and has an overall length measuring 21". The cost of the tool and Option #3 Cutter is \$115 including shipping.

The experiences I've had with them have been extremely rewarding, and ASD has responded very positively. New Turning Woods

Just a quick note let folks know that we have added considerable new turning stock at the Woodcraft Store in Manchester. We've added such species as Osage Orange, Argentine Lignum Vitae, Honduran Rosewood, Cocobolo, Redheart, Olivewood, Tuplipwood and Pink Ivory to name a few. The sizes generally are

 $1\times1\times12$, $1.5\times1.5.6$, $2\times2\times12$, $5\times5\times2$ and $6\times6\times2$. There was also 4/4 lumber added that can be glued up as well. New inventory was put out late August, it's been moving well. If there is something you especially like, let me know, we will be reordering.

Wood of the Month!

Bubinga (Guibourtia Demeusei)

Grows: Central & West Central Africa Health risks: Dermatitis, skin lesions

Description: The heartwood is med red-brown with lighter red to purple veining. The grain runs straight with distinctive annual rings. .

Properties: Works satisfactorily with hand tools, although moderate to severe dulling may occur due to the silica in the wood. Pre-drilling is required and gluing maybe difficult due to glue pockets.

Typical Uses: Primarily used as a veneer for cabinetwork, furniture, and paneling. Other uses include boatbuilding, flooring and prized for turnery.

Purpleheart (Phoebe porosa (Laureaceae))

Grows: Central American & Northern South America Health risks: Dust can cause irritation & nausea

Description: One of the most distinctive woods in the world, purpleheart is prized for its very unusual deep purple color. When freshly cut, this dense hardwood is light brown. Within minutes the surface turns an astonishing bright purple. Upon prolonged exposure to sunlight, the color gradually changes to a chocolate-purple color. This beautiful wood is straight to wavy grained, fine and uniform textured and fairly smooth with a medium to high luster. Purpleheart turns smoothly, is easy to glue, takes finishes well and is highly durable

Properties: It is a fairly hard, heavy & dense wood. It is difficult to work by hand & blunting of cutters is moderate to severe.

Typical Uses: Flooring, bridge building, quality furniture, siding, vats, pilings, turnery, billiard or pool-cue butts, boatbuilding, inlays, handles & decorative veneers.

African Padauk (Pterygota bequaertii)

Grows: Tropical West Africa

Health risks: Sawdust can cause skin & respiratory problems, swelling of the eyelids, itching & vomiting.

Description: Straight to interlocked grain with a moderately coarse texture and large pores. Rich red to purple red heartwood and pale-beige sapwood.

Properties: Hard, heavy, and strong with exceptional decay resistance and dimensional stability. Not suitable for steam bending. Only slight blunting of cutters. Pre-drilling is advisable.

Typical Uses: Furniture, joinery, cabinetmaking, parquet flooring and decorative veners.
