February Demo by Jim Kephart "Suggestions On How To Demo & Beginning Bowl Turning"

Jim's Outline Notes:

How to Demo Steps

- *What are you demonstrating, focus on what you think is important, not too many items or no one will get anything (short of a week long class)
- *Sequence or other type
- *Make outline, key steps. key points
- *Start by introducing yourself and then tell what you are going to do overall
- *For a particular step especially tricky or key items reinforce ides by telling how to do it and show how its done
- *Reiterate how it was done (people are not always capable of watching and hearing at the same time)
- *Build repetition for key items
- *Focus on main key items, overload makes things muddy, overwhelms
- *If too long for time have several partials complete
- *If possible have a finished sample to show where you are going
- *Slow down
- *Make sure camera (if available) shows what you are doing, if not stop and hold tool so it is possible to see angles, approach, etc
- *Watch your audience, see if they seem to be following you. I was told about 1/3 of an audience may be elsewhere daydreaming (problems at home, and/or work, remembering what to bring home, sex fantasies (Hopefully not about me)
- *If questions, repeat the question so everyone hears it
- *if a question is more appropriate for later, say so and cover it later
- *Make a list of what you need to bring or have supplied
- *Pick an appropriate size, a 30" bowl will take too long for a demo. An 8' to 10" bowl will suffice
- * Dammit, have some fun

Jim Kephart's Notes continued:

Scrape

Shear scrape

- *Mount blank
- *Turn round
- *Establish tenon for chuck
- *Shape outside (For beginning pick flow shape for easy learning tool control, save tougher shapes for later
- *Refine outside
- *Sand, power sand
- *Mount on chuck
- *Establish depth of vessel, drill?
- *Show entry cut, bevel rub
- *Remove center with push cut, usually inside parallels outside
- *Check wall thickness, repeat
- *Clean rim
- *Back cut or scraper
- *Reverse chuck to do foot

Cole Jaws, etc

Vacuum chuck

*Finish options

Oil is easy and brings out grain

Waterlox

Boiled linseed oil

**Mike came to open shop with a problem. He wanted to drill a 3/8" hole x 14" deep into the end of a 2" sq x 48". Jim Kephart suggested that stock mounted between centers on the lathe. Well, how do you drill the hole after the stock in mounted between centers? Easy—drill through the tail stock into the wood. Open shop is a learning place!!!!

PEPPERMILL CHALLENGE

At the March meeting, two turners who have <u>never</u> turned a peppermill will be given a chance to do so. If more than two turners wish to participate, a drawing will be held to select two. The wood, the 10" mill operating parts and directions will be supplied free of charge. Those that take part in this event must finish the mills and bring them to the CCW April meeting. - 7. ANY COST (MEAL AND FACILITY) WOULD BE PAID BY ATTENDING MEMBERS


The turning clubs that may participate:
